Generic TUTOR TIPS for Books

BEFORE READING

- Preview front and back of the book, viewing illustrations and title.
- Skim quickly through pages noting illustrations (plus noting any Table of Contents, Glossary words, and Index.)
 - Tutor: While scanning, collect a few words you think may be difficult for your student. Point them out, pronounce and explain them.
- Ask student:

Nonfiction

- "What do you think this book is about?"
- "Do you think it is fiction or nonfiction? Why?"
- "What do you already know about this topic? Explain how you found out."
- "What would you like to learn from this book?"

Fiction (DO NOT SHOW THE ENDING.)

- "Who do you think is the main character in this book?"
- "What do you think might be the character's problem?
- "What do you think will happen in the end?"
- "Have you ever experienced something similar to what seems to be going on in this story? Explain."
- Decide on how book will be read: child reads; both tutor and child share reading alternate pages; tutor reads with expression.

DURING READING

- Coach student in decoding difficult words. Use illustrations, insert <u>blank</u> in context-what makes sense, word chunks-beginning/middle/end sounds, other related words/word families, etc. *Tutor: Build vocabulary flash cards (from index cards) for practice and review games.*
- Ask student 1-3 questions per page:
 - * Does child know the meaning of a correctly pronounced word? For example, "Find the word that means..."
 - * Can the child paraphrase a sentence/paragraph/page in his/her own words?
 - * Ask the child to discuss his/her opinion of a character or a character's actions.
 - * Fiction: See if the child can recognize a cause (reason why) and effect (result) relationship in the plot.
 - Nonfiction: Can the child give 3-5 details that support the main idea.
 - * Ask the child to predict what will happen next and explain why.
 - * Can the child retell what was read so far?
 - * Ask the child to create a "mind movie" and relate what is seen, heard, smelled, felt, and/or tasted in the scene.

AFTER READING

- Ask the child to recall details from the beginning, middle, and end of the book.
- Discuss the author's purpose in writing this book: to inform, to explain how, to entertain, to persuade.
- Ask: Did you like this book? Why or why not? Who else might want to read this book? For what purpose?
- Discuss how topics in the book may relate to the child's life in some way, or discuss the child's opinions of the book's theme.

GRAPHIC ORGANIZER

- Choose a way for the child to organize thoughts of the book visually. Present or create a Venn diagram, Story Elements web, 5 Ws web, etc. (*Tutor: Google search "Graphic Organizers" for many forms from which to choose.*) Have child draw or write answers.

VOCABULARY OR COMPREHENSION GAME: Tic-Tac-Toe, Dot-to-Dot, Hangman, etc.

- Use book related flash cards for vocabulary game.
- Take turns asking each other questions from the book which must be answered correctly to move forward in game.
